Masters of Ceremonies, Rick Taylor and Howard Dwellion were given the responsibility to keep the show moving. Armed with a bag full of "Dad jokes" they made sure there was no dead space before introducing the next act.

A high energy opening act included dancers, singers and the band to the music of Cole Porter's *Another Op' Nin' Another Show*. The next act featured Yvonne Remz accompanying herself on *Find Your People*. Yvonne is a singer/songwriter who joined the ranks of the Maestros after learning about us through the talent search process for the show.



Next up was Rusty LaBarre singing *Beyond the Sea* with the band and chorus. Rusty is a retired music teacher, and although he is active with many FRVA chapters, he is not yet a Maestro. We're working on that.

Buddy Holly (aka Carl Turner) sang *Oh Boy*. It brought lots of audience participation. Carl is a long time member of the Maestros. He has a Master's degree in Church Music.

A trumpet trio of Ari Siegler, Paul Monat and Bruce Taylor performed *Bugler's Holiday*. They were accompanied by Ron Hazlett on the keyboard. All are long time members of the Maestros.

Summertime, a flute solo featuring Cindy Lee was accompanied by Dave Lambert playing Harmonica and Ron Hazelett on the Keyboard. Maestros all.

Carl Turner and spouse Marty sang Driving Time an RV parody based on Buck Owen's Crying Time.

Barry Manilow's award winning *Copacabana* set the stage for a skit based on the story featuring Edda Martin, David Lambert and Leigh Remz. Music was provided by the full band and chorus.

A change of pace featured Ron Hazelett accompanying himself on a powerful old gospel song Lord I Want to Go Home. Amen!

The popular Folk/Bluegrass/ Country, *Wagon Wheel*, was led by Ben Woods (guitar), David Lambert (harmonica) and Yvonne Remz. The audience was asked to join in on the chorus parts.

Paul Monat put down his tuba that he normally plays with the Maestros and picked up his cornet which he is professionally known for and presented a stirring solo of *The Prayer*. He was accompanied by Ron Hazelett.

The Battle Hymn of the Republic, arranged by Ron Hazelett, formed the backdrop for the last letter home from a Civil War soldier. It was read by Dwellion Howard and was accompanied by keyboard with the full band and chorus joining in for the finale. At its conclusion there was not a dry eye in the house.

The Show was concluded with the Maestro tribute to the Armed Forces featuring the US Army, the US Marines, the US Navy, the US Air Force, the US Coast Guard, and the US Space Force Songs. Following the Service Songs was a rendition of Lee Greenwood's *God Bless the USA* presented by a large chorus from the Penn Coachmen. Predictably this song caused the audience to STAND UP and join in the singing of this patriotic classic.

# **The Great Eastern Area Rally From a Maestro Point of View**



Having the Great Eastern Area Rally (GEAR) at Myrtle Beach showed the impact of what a "destination location" can have. There was a waiting list for registrations and a waiting list for Vendor spots.

Part of the problem was the size of the Ocean Lakes Activities Center. It is the only inside space available and can seat approximately 600 people with vendor space and other activities limited to the perimeter of the building. All of the entertainment, including the Talent Show and morning Coffee performances, was limited to the Stage. The stage was also used as one of the Seminar Rooms during the day. All of our setup had to be moved to a backstage storage room following each performance.

The decision for the Maestros to remain at Hideaway RV Resort after the conclusion of Music Camp for the GEAR rehearsal days proved to be a wise one. We moved to Ocean Lakes on Tuesday in time to get everything set up and do a run through of the GEAR'S GOT TALENT show. We did a final rehearsal Wednesday morning for the Wednesday evening show.

Even with all of the extra work due to the limited space, the Activities Center proved to be a good performance venue. The sound system provided by Gary Cipa worked superbly. With the help of Bill Murton we also figured out how to use the TV monitors spaced throughout the building to project song lyrics for audience Sing-a-longs.

At the GEAR'S GOT TALENT Show Sue Siegler introduced the Maestros Theme Song for this Rally: Jimmy Buffet's *Margaritaville*. We began every performance with this song. It is interesting to note that two of the three other entertainment acts, **Carson Peters & Iron Mountain** and **too Much SyLvia** both mentioned that they had a request that "was not in our normal playlist, but we'll give it a shot". What a coincidence--both sang *Margaritaville*. Thanks Sue.

We had a long playlist rehearsed and ready to go for the three morning coffee times. Unfortunately the Friday performance had to be scrubbed to accommodate an added seminar that preempted our time slot and commandeered the stage area. We did play for both Thursday and Saturday morning coffee times and the feedback from these as well as the Talent Show was great. Many said it was the best ever. The Chapter Fair on Wednesday generated some interest but inquiries continued throughout the rally. We must be doing something right.

With all of us scattered around the huge campground of Ocean Lakes it presented a couple of issues. One was getting Maestros picked up by Activity carts. We had exclusive use of the activities building which was more than adequate size-wise, with plenty of room for the band and chorus as well as plenty of room for social activities, meals, etc. Parking was also ideal. Full hookups, 50/30 amp power, level concrete pads and close to the activities building made it one of the nicest locations we could ask for.

Music Camp predictably became a workshop for the GEAR's Got Talent Show. New music sometimes proved to be challenging for both the band and the chorus. Also, the band was somewhat handicapped without lower brass (trombones/baritones) and no percussionist. Fortunately we had skilled Music Directors, Sue Siegler and Ron Hazelett. A good rhythm guitar section and a set of wood claves covered for the lack of a drummer. We also had two keyboard players which allowed for critical instrumental parts to be covered. The Maestros are blessed to have musical professionals that know how to get the best possible sound with the resources available.

Besides learning new music, another new wrinkle for the chorus was to learn some dance steps for the opening production number—*ANOTHER OP' NIN', ANOTHER SHOW.* The Activities building was large enough for us to mark off the stage area with painter's tape that represented the Ocean Lakes stage. This proved to be extremely valuable for the band, chorus and especially staging the opening production number.



## **Northeast Area Rally**

Many from our Chapter made the trip up to the Northeast Rally in Essex Junction, Vermont. The Champlain Valley Exposition is a beautiful and very large facility though only a small fraction of it was used for the rally. The mainstage was set up in one end of the Expo South building and was used only for evening entertainment. Everything else was in the Blue Ribbon Pavillion—registration; vendors, including the FRVA store; seminar rooms; morning coffee and donuts; and of course the Maestros, except for the Thursday evening concert. The hallway connecting the Expo South building and the Blue Ribbon building housed very nice restroom and shower facilities.

The advance team, Nick Heffner and Carl Turner, chose sites that were right next to the Expo North building which had 30 amp electric and water. Most of us decided it was a workable location. 50 amp sites were a long ways away.

Almost everyone was in by Sunday and we began rehearsals on Monday. Music Director Ron Hazelett had put out a play list ahead of time. We set up for rehearsals in the Expo South building because that is where the stage was to be set up. When we got the Program we discovered they had the Maestros scheduled for Wednesday night and Thursday Night (following the Opening Ceremony) as well as morning coffee time Thursday-Saturday.

We chose to create a small combo to handle the Wednesday evening slot. Walt Porter (Banjo), Bonnie Porter (Mandolin), Carl Turner (Guitar) along with Ron Hazelett (Keyboard) formed a Bluegrass Band on the spot. They played for about an hour and a half. It was a big hit.

The morning coffee times went OK using a variety of music from our library. It was a challenge, however, to keep volume levels down since the Blue Ribbon building was so small. The Thursday Evening program in the Expo South building went much better. Besides traditional favorites we also did our Military Tribute using all of the service songs including the addition of the Space Force Song.

On Saturday there was a Chapter Fair/Block Party and we chose the outdoor plaza between the Expo North and the Expo South buildings. It was an ideal location, and for the Maestros it was a time to jam. It must have been successful because at the end of our play time nearly all the trays of purchased food had been consumed and there was still an audience.

Most of the confusion at this Rally was driven by a much smaller attendance than planned. This problem dictated changes to the schedule and the use of various parts of the facilities. They have assured us this was a learning experience and will be corrected for the 2026 Rally planned in the same location. It will be held a few weeks earlier in October which should help with attendance.

All in all the Maestros would say they had fun playing and that it was a good Rally.

## **East Coast Maestros Join Forces**

This has been a busy fall season for Frustrated Maestros in the Eastern Areas. Starting with the Northeast Area Rally in Essex Junction, Vermont in mid-October and down to the Eastern Area's Music Camp the last week of October in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina followed by the GEAR's Got Talent Show and of course the Great Eastern Area Rally the first week+ in November.
